

CHALLENGES IN OPERATIONALIZING A COMMUNITY MENTAL HEALTH PROGRAM IN WESTERN RURAL INDIA

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Background:

Community based programs deploying Community Health workers have been used globally as low-cost alternatives to serve communities. These programs are based on a task-shifting model, especially in resource poor settings and require extensive training and supervision.

Methods:

A community based mental health program was implemented by the Foundation of Research in Community Health in rural parts of Western India and a thorough process documentation was used to collect data by means of informal discussions and interaction with the program staff.

Results:

Programme level challenges:

- Recruitment of personnel
- Sensitization to mental health for program personnel
- Absorption of mental health concepts
- Community grounded in traditional beliefs
- Appropriate CHW to population ratio
- Establishing referral linkages
- Addressing rehabilitation concerns of the patients
- Supervising the heavy documentation

Community level challenges:

- Power equations in the community
- Participation from the community
- Misconceptions and suspicions regarding mental health

Systemic challenges:

- Transfer the expertise and knowledge to the public health systems
- Maintaining regular drug procurement
- Inclusion of mental health at primary care level









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
